## Or: Is Trouble Brewing Under Your House?

Recently Allison Brown was kind enough to invite me to check the progress of her and Bob's top-to-bottom remodel of their East End Victorian. I always learn something from such experiences. While there were multiple lessons from that particular visit, I'd like to focus on one that I think is important for many of us.

All their exposed plumbing pipes were wrapped in foam sleeves (available from Chalmers). As I inspected, I realized Cathy's and my house lacked such protection from a freeze. I spent the next day bent in half in the space under our house, cutting and fitting insulation for the pipes and lashing it in place with plastic ties—the kind East Enders use to secure their exterior shutters with (also available from Chalmers).

While under our house, I discovered trouble that I suspect lurks under the houses of many East Enders. Plumbing and gas lines are often suspended under our homes with metal clips or metal tape. The tape is easy to cut. Pre-punched holes in the tape provide a place for screws or nails to anchor the tape to wooden joists under the house. This tape contains iron, so it can rust.

When Ike flooded under our houses, these metal parts got soaked with salt water. In the time since Ike struck, several of the straps that had held our pipes in place had completely rusted through. Pipes—both gas and water—were hanging precariously under our house. Had I not picked up more metal tape from Chalmers and re-suspended these pipes, we might have had some very unpleasant surprises down the road, with pipes eventually falling to the ground and potentially breaking, leaking natural gas or gushing water in the process.

If you have a raised cottage and have enough space underneath to take a look, I recommend you do so or hire a contractor to look for you. If there are plumbing and/or gas pipes hanging under your house

suspended by metal clips or metal tape, inspect these supports. Even if your pipes were suspended with plastic tape (which is weaker than metal but doesn't rust), it's still important to inspect them. As with the metal tape, the plastic tape is fastened into place with nails or screws. Both usually contain iron. They rust. Ike may well have sent them to an early death.


other clothes as we're hoping we have so much great STUFF, we don't want to deal with clothes. However, PLEASE feel free to bring formal and Dickens outfits.

# Neighborwoods II Update EEHDA Neighborwoods Program Dave Schuler

Trees! More Trees! As I'm sure you've noticed, the EEHDA NeighborWoods II committee has been busily distributing door hangers and tree signs throughout the East End neighborhood. As of January 20<sup>th</sup> we've received positive responses that represent almost 50% of the target locations. Plus, if you drive around San Jacinto, Lasker Park, Silk Stocking District and Old Seawall neighborhoods you'll their signs as well. While we'd chosen Saturday, January 8<sup>th</sup> for our walk day – and were rewarded with beautiful weather - San Jacinto chose Sunday, January 9<sup>th</sup> and if you remember, it rained cats, dogs and gerbils. In spite of that, however, I've been assured that the San Jacinto NeighborWoods program is in fine shape.

As expected, the number of tree stumps, alley openings and power lines on the numbered streets has cut down on the initial number of tree locations. However, we're also walking the numbered streets, looking for additional in-fill locations. With regards to tree species, initial feedback on the response cards shows a preference for live oaks, but once again we see a wide diversity of species being requested.



# 2011 East End Historical **Home Sales Market**

Great news! Home prices in areas hard-hit by flooding in Hurricane Ike are beginning to slowly climb back after dropping as much as 20% or more after the storm, and should continue this Spring as the traditional selling season kicks into high gear.

In the East End, where as much as six to seven feet of storm surge inundated the area, prices before the storm ranged from around \$110 to \$150 per square foot for homes in good condition with modern upgrades on good streets. Since that time, prices have generally hovered around \$85-110. Homes with garage apartments are going for \$120-\$136 per square foot because only the square footage in the main house is counted in the MLS. Homes that didn't have much flooding in the other historic districts held their values pretty well, with maybe a ten percent pricing dip at

Now that we have finished the second hurricane season without so much as a strong breeze, it may be time to stop and think about the fact that most years really are just like this. Unfortunately, there's not much media fanfare when we don't get a storm!

As memories of the hurricane and its aftermath begin to fade, we should begin looking for a bit of a renaissance with the construction of Galveston's new Pleasure Pier on the site of the Flagship Hotel, which I think will give Galveston a much-needed icon to identify us to the rest of the country--much like the Santa Monica Pier or the Kemah Boardwalk with ferris wheels and rides for children and families to enjoy!

Reconstruction of homes with grant money and new cruise ships harboring in Galveston Bay are two more things that should give prospective homebuyers plenty to look forward to over the next few years. Assuming the economy remains fairly stable and interest rates stay low, we should have a lot to look forward to over the next few years!




# Mardi Gras Brunch
